Call to Worship

Help our unbelief. **R**estore courage in the face of suffering. Invite us into your mission. Send us with your compassion. Then – may your kin-dom come!

Dedication of the Offering:

These physical symbols of wealth and abundance

and the donations we make directly and indirectly

are part of the bigger gift we dedicate today.

Where there is greatest scarcity and need, may these gifts make a difference.

Take our resources, our thoughts, words and actions.

weave them into your blessing of all in your Kin-dom,

that your will may be done! Amen

Sending Out:

Go to bear the story of Jesus Christ, humble ruler, protector of the vulnerable.

Go breathed into life by God's Spirit and blessed in purpose. Go to love and serve God's world for which the Risen Christ lived and died.

Lighting of the Christ candle:

Light flickers and shines to offer us glimpses of a new society,

a new understanding of heaven here on earth.

Sermon Starter

For those of us steeped in the Christian language system, the language of this scripture may seem unremarkable. Why wouldn't someone declare Jesus Christ to be 'the image of the invisible God' and say that 'the fullness of God' is in Christ? That's just basic Christianity. But this fledgling church in Colossae inhabited two zones where such language was dangerous. As part of the dispersed Jewish community, it was blasphemy to say that God had inhabited a human body. To call Jesus Christ or Messiah was to make a truth claim that was offensive and divisive to their neighbours in the local synagogue. The Colossians were also residents (or perhaps citizens) of the Roman Empire, where the Emperor was an incarnation of the divine. So it could be treason to claim that thrones and dominions were subordinate to Jesus. One of the reasons we participate in the Christmas Bowl is because our allegiance is not to the power structures of this world. Peace cannot be obtained through warfare or dominance. Rather, our obligation is to God, who makes peace through the blood of the cross. When we give to the Christmas Bowl, and choose to see the world through the lens of those who are suffering and oppressed, we show our true colours and declare our true monarch.

God's Love in Action

Since it was founded by Rev Frank Byatt in 1949, the Christmas Bowl has brought together committed Australian Christians with dedicated local partners around the world, to give hope to people uprooted by conflict and disaster.

When Rev Byatt sat down to his Christmas dinner all those years ago, he knew millions of people were starving in war-ravaged Europe. And he was compelled to offer help.

He put a Bowl of Remembrance on his Christmas dinner table and asked his loved ones to place a gift in it to 'share your good dinner with hungry children in other lands'.

Frank couldn't have foreseen how his simple act of compassion that evening would grow into the powerful Christmas Bowl tradition now celebrated in thousands of churches across Australia. And he couldn't have known how much it would be needed in our world today.

As we break bread with our loved ones, our thoughts will be with refugees and other displaced communities, who are going hungry this Christmas.

Please join with churches across Australia again this Christmas, as together we share God's love, give hope through practical Christian action, and help create a world where uprooted people have a safe place to belong.

Liturgy



Call to Worship [inspired by Isaiah 2 and Psalm 122]

Let us go to the house of Our God, So that Christ may teach us the way and we may walk holy paths!

Together, we will proclaim the peace of Our God, **Praying for peace and** security for all.

For the sake of all whom we love, **we listen for hope, seeking God's peace.** For the sake of the God we adore, **we will spread hope, by proclaiming God's goodness.**

Prayers of Intercession:

Seed in your world and in us your vision for shalom and refuge with you.

Heal those who are weary of body, mind and soul. Heal the loss of identity that accompanies homelessness and statelessness.

Anticipate heaven in the hearts of warmongers and peacemakers, restoring innocence and blessing them with the capacity to love their enemies.

Reconcile relationships between peoples and your created order.

Enter into the world with prophetic expectation, so that those who are lost to themselves and others, might find their way into your light. May Hostilities cease in places of conflict and war and in homes where safety has been unknown.

May **O**thering of the vulnerable be replaced by the yearning for respect and dignity for all.

May **P**rayers continue to stir daily in our hearts, echoing the prayers we pray we are prompted to pray today... [add local prayers]

May **E**ach of the stories we share in faith today call forth fruitful blessing in our lives and in the world.

Do you wake up each day thinking that this might be the day when God's great clean-up of the world begins? Sometimes called the eschaton or the parousia, the apocalypse or the end-times - Christianity proclaims that there is new world coming. Instead of the pain and injustice of this life, Jesus will return and there will be a new creation. But for most Christians, there is little sense of urgency about the end of the world as we know it. We feel fine. But the early believers, including those who first received this letter to the Romans, anticipated the return of Christ very soon. They imagined a world set to rights, with God's justice for everyone. They weren't doing any long-range planning – they were just holding firm until their beloved Christ returned to establish a new kingdom. They might be surprised that we are still waiting. In a relatively free and prosperous nation, while there might be the odd crisis or deadline, most of us don't live with a sense of urgency. But for people like Eugene and her family, the need for divine justice is real and pressing. Food, medicine, warmth and security are so difficult to obtain, yet in God's future they will be freely available to all. We can't hasten the day of Jesus' return. But, if we believe in the world to come, we can start acting like it is here now. We can put aside our own petty desires and arguments, and put on the armour of light.

SEFUL INFORMATIC

God's Love in Action

When the war began in Ukraine, Eugene was in hospital with her 10-month-old son who was due to receive a heart operation. But when the fighting escalated, Eugene and her family were forced to make the heartbreaking decision to flee the country.

They are just one of the millions of families who have been forced to flee their home in recent months, leading to the biggest displacement crisis in Europe since the Second World War.

Thankfully, compassionate people like you are supporting our local partner, Hungarian Interchurch Aid (HIA), who are providing vital food, shelter and medical supplies for refugees who have fled over the border to Hungary. Since arriving, Eugene has now been able to get medicine for her son and she is hopeful he can get the critical heart operation he desperately needs.

Your gifts through the Christmas will help local partners, like HIA, respond immediately to emergencies like we are seeing in Ukraine, giving families like Eugene's safety in exile – and hope for the future – when they need it most.

In Syria, Farah owned goats and sheep, which they would milk to make cheese, and butter. Farah was struggling until she had the idea to make and sell cheese which she now sells to earn an income.

Second Sunday of Advent: Peace

Liturgy

Call to Worship

Prepare the way of Peace-maker: Make the path straight.

Prepare your hearts for praise: Let music sound loud, as we lift our voices to sing.

Prepare the world for justice: For the Righteous One comes among us... And we will praise God!

Prayers of Intercession:

Still our spirits, so we can hear the needs of the world. Give us your heart and mind.

Help us to develop compassion for those who mourn.

Heal and make whole those who suffer from trauma and the anxiety of separation.

Answer the groanings of those who do not yet know how to pray with mercy.

Restore those who have lost their resources and refill their lives with blessing.

Enable endurance among those who wait,

May we become sources of their encouragement.

Send your Spirit upon those who face violence and conflict.

Hold fast to those who cling to your promises.

Amplify the efforts to bring peace – challenge the hearts of the greedy and bless the generous.

Love the World and Love your People, just as you call us to love You and One another.

Open us to SHALOM in new ways, with new understandings and new relationships.

Make us people of peace in your name.

Dedication of the Offering:

May swords be beaten into ploughshares and may this money become food and education and health and community.

May minefields be returned to gardensand may the first fruits become signs of shared life in the world. And may this sharing bring peace. Amen

Sending Out:

Go – not with passivity – be filled with an active, energizing peace. Bear fruit worthy of repentance. Burn with unquenchable fire. So, Go – be PEACE-makers in the world,

Clothed in the peace of God, Creator Redeemer and Sustainer. Amen

Lighting of the Advent Candle (Peace):

Here we tell the ancient tale, coming to the story circle of lights. This second flame is to bring balance and the promise of harmony.

This is the candle of Peace. Let us honour the Light! [pause]

Bible Readings:

First Reading: Isaiah 11:1-10 Psalm: Psalm 72:1-7, 18-19 Second Reading: Romans 15:4-13 Gospel: Matthew 3:1-12 Ashia, along with her husband and their three children fled to Jordan from Syria where they camped on the border for three days starving without food or water. Ashia is working hard to support her family with her pastry business.



It is now a cliché for churches to write All Welcome on signs and flyers. While we probably believe it, just writing 'all welcome' isn't enough. It doesn't necessarily mean that strangers will be included, and it certainly doesn't mean that outsiders will be heard and valued. When Paul implores the Roman church to 'welcome one another... just as Christ has welcomed you' he is not talking about pot-luck dinners or a youth group games night. He is addressing a serious division in the church, between those who kept the Jewish religious codes, and those who didn't. This conflict was exacerbated when Emperor Claudius expelled Jews from Rome in 49CE. By the time Emperor Nero allowed them back, the Gentile Christians may have had the upper hand over the Jewish Christians. Paul has asked the believers not to judge or provoke one another, and now he emphasises that God always planned to include Gentiles in the vision. The church is still struggling to include all people in God's work. But when we hear a story like Ashia's we see the futility of our exclusion. In a world of so much inequity, we need 'all hands on deck' to assist in God's mission. Welcoming new people isn't for our benefit, but for the benefit of the world.



The safest way to distribute your giving envelopes is to place them on chairs before the service. This makes a significant difference to the success of the Christmas Bowl and will make it easier for your congregation to access the envelopes. If you are meeting virtually you can share the link to your church's unique donation page so members of your congregation can make their gift securely online.

God's Love in Action

It's been eleven years since the civil war broke out in Syria, with thousands of families still living in neighbouring countries like Jordan. But as the cost-of-living increases, many refugee families are struggling to earn enough money to put food on the table.

At home in Syria, Ashia along with her husband and their three children had a happy life where they ran a chicken farm that produced meat and eggs. Although Ashia and her family have found peace in Jordan, they have struggled to make enough money to feed their family.

Act for Peace's local partner, the Near East Council of Churches - Department of Service to Palestinian Refugees (DSPR), supports Syrian refugees by providing vital food rations and psychosocial care. They are also providing economic training for women like Ashia, who has now started her own pastry business, that is helping support her family.

Through the Christmas Bowl, you'll help DSPR continue to meet the immediate needs of Syrian refugees while empowering women like Ashia to be more resilient and prepared for the challenges ahead.

Third Sunday of Advent: Joy

Liturgy

Call to Worship

The blossoming of jacarandas and the hopping of quokkas tell of rejoicing. Creation breaks forth in joy.

Desert sands ripple and vast expanses of ocean casts waves onto shore, Creation dances in joy. In places of flood and in places of drought, we ask that again:

Creation may flow with joy.

We are called to worship God with rejoicing: Strengthen our weak hands and make firm our feeble knees (Isaiah 35:3)

Let us sing and dance before our God!

Prayers of Intercession:

God, in whom we find our joy, Set the prisoners free and loose the captives and the oppressed. Hear the cries of those who are in the wilderness.

Add to our numbers those who would work for your purposes. Remember the poor in spirit and those who suffer pain or loss. **E**xpand the talanoa of your gathering to include those who are marginalized and those who feel beyond our easy reach. [talanoa is Tongan for gathering to talk and share]

Remind us of your love for the poor and remember us when we are distressed.

Enter the world afresh this Advent, bless those who find this time hardest. Jesus, gather your scattered flock and let the deaf hear, the blind see and the lame dance.

Ofa atu – we love you, God – gift us with your love to share around.

Increase the joy in our community lift the hearts of the depressed.

Care for and restore your blessed Creation - so we may rejoice with Creation again.

Expand the Church, so we may spread your good news more effectively.

Dedication of the Offering:

Preparing for Christmas, we plan for gift-giving and we may even be asked what we might like ourselves.

We are challenged when we consider the cost of food for those who are hungry.

Reminded of the work in Zimbabwe, we say Jesu tawa pano -

Jesus we are here for you - take what we offer.

And may this sharing bring joy. Amen

Sending Out:

May rejoicing continue in days ahead. May tears turn to laughter and mourning into dancing.

May God, Three-in-One and One-in-Three,

Hold you and Bless you in the family of Joy, now and always. Amen

Lighting of the Advent Candle (Joy):

Here we tell the ancient tale, coming to the story circle of lights This third light is to bring delight and rejoicing.

This is the candle of Joy. Let us honour the Light! [pause]

Bible Readings:

First Reading: Isaiah 35:1-10 **Psalm:** Psalm 146:5-10 or Luke 1:46b-55 Second Reading: James 5:7-10 Gospel: Matthew 11:2-11

Priscilla is enrolled in the Conservation Farming program. Before joining, Priscilla and her family were food insecure. She could not grow enough to feed her family and they survived by begging for food.

Sermon Starter

Yet again, as we make our way through Advent, there is a sense of urgency in the scripture readings. And maybe, yet again, we find ourselves wondering if God's kingdom will ever arrive. Will the day come when there is food enough for all, and no child goes hungry? We can easily become despondent when we consider the world's injustice. But a farmer like Priscilla in Zimbabwe knows that worrying will not make the crops grow. Whether for a field of wheat, or parsley in a pot, patience is required if we want to reap and eat. Just like the prophets of old, the fledgling church needed to be resilient. Yes, it's tempting to grumble when things are not going how we would like, but James reminds the church that Christ the benevolent judge is on the doorstep, about to enter. As we get closer to Christmas, and the carols and decorations become pervasive, will we actually invite Jesus off the verandah and into our homes? Through the Christmas Bowl, and through our commitment to God's Dream, we can welcome in Jesus to our Advent, to our Christmas, and to our hearts.

Priscilla's community has been severely affected by years of drought which decimated her crops and left her unable to feed her family. Priscilla would spend the whole day without food and have just one meal in the evening which she would share with her children.

Act for Peace's local partner, Christian Care, with support from the Australian Government through the Australian NGO Cooperation Program (ANCP), is working closely with communities like Priscilla's to provide training in the latest climate-resilient farming techniques. The farmers are also receiving basic seed and grain packs, fertilisers, and small livestock that are helping them grow food sustainably.

God's Love in Action

Zimbabwe is suffering from critically low food reserves, as climate change brings harsher and more frequent drought. The impacts of the climate crisis, rising inflation and the ongoing war in Ukraine are making the economic situation worse by driving up food prices. Families already living in poverty and hunger are now being plunged further into crisis.

Through your gift this Christmas Bowl, families like Priscilla can now be more food secure and can better withstand the climate and economic shocks facing the country.

Fourth Sunday of Advent: Love

Call to Worship

Liturgy

Give us life and call us to yourself And we will call upon your name.

Restore us, O God. Let your face shine, that we might be saved.

Shine on us this day, O God, We come to praise and worship you – God coming to be with us!

Prayers of Intercession:

God, whose name is LOVE,

Send your Spirit of compassion upon the earth.

Give double measures to people who work in the caring professions. Increase the numbers of volunteers giving for the sake of other. Bless those who put themselves in harms way, to protect the defenceless.

Hear the cries of your people, O God. Hear the silent accusations of the forgotten and bring them comfort. Hear the confessions of the guilty and shamed and restore them. Advocate on our behalf, O Jesus – help us to know and be known in our humanity.

Give us voices to stand in solidarity with those who are mute.

Rescue our loving, when it fails or fades. Bring back our passion for life and love.

Enter the places of hate and conflict and impose your amazing love. Encourage compassion between Sri Lankans to bring a miracle of lasting love.

Let the whole world know how to love again.

Offer us opportunities to show love and be loved.

Vanish hatred by your presence.

Emmanuel - come - we need you!

Dedication of the Offering:

The hungry have been fed with the bread of tears. (Psalm 80:5)

May our tables expand to feed people from our own plates.

May our hearts break open as we break bread,

so that sharing with others is our spiritual fulfillment.

And may this sharing bring your sacred love into your world once more. Amen

Sending Out:

With hearts full, go into Christmas week, prepared to see all of creation embodied in a tiny child. With generosity and compassion, See beyond tinsel to the stars that guide us.

Be blessed by the God who comes, again and again: Creator, Emmanuel, Comforter.

Amen

Lighting of the Advent Candle (Love):

We continue the story of generations, Telling a story into the circle of lights. This fourth light is for compassion and heart.

This is the candle of LOVE.

Let us honour the Light! [pause]

Bible Readings:

First Reading: Isaiah 7:10-16 Psalm: Psalm 80:1-7, 17-19 Second Reading: Romans 1:1-7 Gospel: Matthew 1:18-25 Kavitha and her son Adhi are Sri Lankan refugees currently living in a camp in south India where she was supported by our local partner, OfERR, during her pregnancy.

Sermon Starter

Does the opening paragraph of Paul's letter to the Romans have anything to say to a refugee in India in urgent need of medical care? Yes, it does. But only if we believe that the good news Paul proclaims is good news for everyone. If we narrow down the good news so that it is only good news of personal salvation for true believers, then we won't care much about Kavitha's blood condition. But if in Paul's greeting we can glimpse the true meaning of 'grace and peace', then a woman receiving injections that meant she could safely carry her baby to term becomes very important. Paul, let us remember, was a violent persecutor. He was an enforcer of rules and a lover of the law. But, transformed by Christ, he received a vision to transform the world. He wanted to recruit more and more members of a movement which would spread unconditional love and nonviolence throughout the most powerful political dominion in the world. The audacity is breathtaking. But his vision, God's vision, still continues. With every act of kindness and every instance of compassion, the good news is infiltrating the world. You are called to be a saint of this movement of grace and peace. Will you help it spread?

God's Love in Action

Many Sri Lankan refugees living in exile in India are finally ready to make the journey home to the country they love. But the current economic crisis and food shortages in Sri Lanka means it's not safe for them to return, leaving many still needing support in the refugee camps.

Kavitha lives in a camp with her husband and two young children. She has suffered two miscarriages and was diagnosed with a blood condition during her pregnancy.

Thankfully our local partner, the Organisation for Eelam Refugees Rehabilitation (OfERR), with support from the Australian Government through the Australian NGO Cooperation Program (ANCP), has been providing vital medical care for refugees like Kavitha. She received injections that meant she could safely carry her baby to term.

Through the Christmas Bowl you are helping OfERR continue to provide lifesaving medical care for refugees while they wait for Sri Lanka to be safe again. Once the crisis ends, families like Kavitha's will finally be able to find a safe place to belong in their homeland.

Sermon Starter

Renounce impiety. Renounce worldly passions. Be self-controlled, upright and godly. It sounds like an end of year speech from the stuffy headmaster of a conservative school! What next, using the proper forks and learning how to curtsy? We could easily mistake this short section of the letter to Titus for a prim little lesson on respectability. Easily, that is, unless we read right to the end. What is the purpose of all this purity? Good deeds. The real purpose of a disciplined life is to mirror the self-emptying love of Jesus. With God's help, we get our own life in order so that we can serve others. This means we approach worship differently. We sing carols of praise to the Christ-child so that we are strengthened to serve the suffering children of the world. We pray to the God who sent Jesus so that we might see the world with Christ's compassionate eyes. And when we consume Christ's own precious body, we remember all those bodies still suffering in our world today. At Christmas we come close to the baby Jesus in the manger, who draws us closer to our neighbours in a world so desperately in need of a Saviour.

Sermon Starter

Even in the most functional of families, siblings crave the attention and affection of their parents. This can rapidly become competitive. Some parents play into it by picking favourites, even if they don't admit it. When we speak of God as a divine Father, we often transfer that same rivalry. How many of us want to be God's favourite? Sometimes each privilege or success is taken as proof that we are especially beloved. But Christianity won't give oxygen to that nonsense. Our entire community has just put aside immense time and energy to mark the birthday of Jesus. Now the letter to the Hebrews reminds us that we share the same parent as Jesus. The one who sanctifies and those who are sanctified all have one Father, Jesus is not ashamed to call us brothers and sisters, and we share flesh and blood with Jesus. Wow. We are God's children, and with Jesus we share in the power of the resurrection and his victory over death. This changes everything. If God loves all God's children with equal passion, who are we to do anything different?

About Act for Peace

For more than 70 years, Act for Peace - the international humanitarian agency of the National Council of Churches - has brought people together to create a more just and peaceful world. As an expression of the life of churches in Australia we draw our inspiration from Jesus who demonstrated solidarity with those who were marginalised and oppressed.

We were founded in 1948, by the then Australian Council for the World Council of Churches, to provide urgently needed aid to refugees and others suffering in Europe from the horrors of the Second World War.

Leading this work was a Methodist minister from Victoria, Rev. Frank Byatt. His mission was to unify Australian Christians of all traditions to work together to put the word of the Gospel into action; and in 1949 he founded the visionary Christmas Bowl appeal which is now supported each year by tens of thousands of people from a wide range of denominations.

"The evangel is complete only when the action of the Gospel matches the message of the gospel." Rev. Frank Byatt, 1954.

Since these humble beginnings, our work has expanded in both reach and impact through projects with local partners, and advocacy with governments and others in power. In 2008, our name changed to Act for Peace, and today we work to reduce forced displacement across Africa, the Middle East, Asia and the Pacific.

Working with others remains core to our DNA. We act to support uprooted people in their role as leaders, work in solidarity with long-term local partners, and leverage the strengths and reach of the global network of local ecumenical agencies of which we are a part. We're joined by thousands of churches and tens of thousands of other members of the public in Australia who share our values. And we work collaboratively as a member of local, regional and global networks and alliances, including the ACT Alliance, the Australian Council for International Development, the Australian Church Agency Network, the Asia Pacific Refugee Rights Network, Micah Australia and the Emergency Action Alliance, all working together to combine resources, share expertise and achieve greater impact.

How we're making it happen (Our change strategy)

At the heart of our work is a powerful conviction: to create a just and peaceful society, we have to work together. It's both the right thing to do, and the only thing that will work.



BACKING **DISPLACED PEOPLE**

We're working in solidarity with local partners; building partnerships that mobilise the knowledge, determination, and skills of displaced people to create change; and resourcing locally-led initiatives that reduce displacement and create safety, dignity and belonging for uprooted people.



BUILDING UNITY

We're tackling the underlying drivers of inequality and displacement by reducing division and polarisation and building empathy in society. And we're creating opportunities for people to positively influence those around them, so they act in support of people who have been forcibly displaced.

Thank you for being a part of this important work.



Right now, we're living in a world of 'us' versus 'them'. Divisions are deepening, conflicts are escalating, and climate inaction is placing lives in peril. It means every day, more of us around the world are forced from our homes by conflict and disaster.

What we're working towards

(Our goals)

Together, we're working towards three goals to create a world where people uprooted by conflict and disaster have a safe place to belong. Acting, together, for peace.



SAFETY IN EXILE

We're working to ensure people can live in safety, with dignity, while displaced. This means they can access critical physical and emotional support (food, water, medicine, psychological support); lead activities and advocate for change; and ultimately have control over their lives, ensuring their safety, dignity and rights.



A PLACE TO BELONG

We're helping uprooted people find a permanent place to belong; supporting them to lead initiatives that help build a safe, permanent future, and holding countries to account so they share responsibility for supporting survivors of displacement.



REDUCED DISPLACEMENT

We're taking action so fewer people are forced to flee their homes; through community-led initiatives such as drought resistant farming and cyclone preparedness training, to reduce the impact of disasters and other displacement drivers. And we're encouraging governments and the public to take action to reduce conflict and climate-driven displacement.





TRANSFORMING THE SYSTEM

We're advocating for a radically different response to the displacement crisis. We're learning from displaced people, forming broad networks, and standing together to collectively influence regional, national and global authorities to share responsibility, resources and power equitably; and act on climate and conflicts.

How to return your gifts

The easiest way to take part is to hand out giving envelopes and ask members of your congregation to post them back to us directly (with a cheque or credit card details).

If you have collected gifts as a church, this is how you can forward them to Act for Peace:
